

CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

As the year draws to a close it is time to reflect on what the Parish has been working on and what we have achieved.

We continue to support the weekly Citizens Advice Bureau outreach sessions at Kingsfold. In the first 5 months of this year 113 consultations have taken place with residents in the Parish. We continue to fund this service for the remainder of this year.

Likewise, we continue to support the ESOL (English speakers of Other Languages) service for those that strive to master English and to become fully integrated in our community.

We held elections in May and a number of new Councillors were elected to the Council alongside those re-standing for another term. I'm please to report the new Council is a vibrant and enthusiastic group fully committed to supporting the community needs.

We are proud to continue to support organised coach trips throughout the summer for our senior citizens and families and again will continue to do so for the rest of the year. The Christmas Market trip is to St Albans this year and we are providing 3 coaches to meet the anticipated demand. Our senior citizens enjoyed a day out at Stratford upon Avon and the families went to Clacton.

We had an immensely successful series of public entertainment events with the VE and VJ days held at Bancroft Park again this year and plan to hold another event in 2016.

We intend to make the Parish a more transparent, and public focused organisation and the Parish website is being completely remodelled with much more information. Over the next few months we will continue to add information about the working of the Parish, documents, accounts, planning decisions and so forth. We continue to welcome constructive comment.



As part of our ongoing work to make the Parish the best possible place in which to live, all of the Councillors have reviewed their areas and reported on parking and landscaping problems. The outcomes of the review is the commitment to initially remind residents not to park in places that damage our green spaces or in places that result in nuisance to pedestrians or mobility scooter users on footpaths. In the long term we are preparing to introduce bye-laws to enforce parking restrictions.

MK Council's short list of 7 estates for regeneration includes the north area of Bradville.

We are aware that conflicting advice is being offered by various parties. It is the Parish Council's commitment to establish the facts of the regeneration and how it impacts our parishioners. To that end we will publish impartial information on our website with links to various sources of information to keep residents up to date.

It only remains for me to wish you all, on behalf of all the Councillors and staff, our best wishes for the oncoming year and a Happy Christmas.

GRAND UNION CANAL

Our cover photo is of the Grand Union Canal north of Blue Bridge which forms the major part of the boundary of our Parish. Constructed at the end of the 18th Century to connect London with Birmingham. With its shorter distance of 137 miles and double locks it provided stiff competition to the existing route via the Oxford Canal and the Thames.

Walking the towpath from Blue Bridge through the Parish you may be lucky enough to see a kingfisher on the first stretch. Cross the aqueduct over Grafton Street – the only one to be built on our canal system in the 20th Century – and you can see the Windmill which has recently been restored to working order. Then we have the New Inn which serves both meals and real ales. The canal glides gently through Bradville and out into the countryside towards Target Turn with the new housing, Medical Centre and Country Park on Oakridge Park on your right. This is a fascinating stretch to walk with views over towards Haversham and Hanslope, mileposts set in the grass with the original canal

name (Grand Junction) still visible and a fine old bridge where you can still see the rope marks made by the horses in the days before boats had engines.

The next bridge takes us to the Black Horse – another pub worth a visit – and on to the former railway bridge over Railway Walk where Newport Nobby ran in the early part of the last century. The next stretch though not in our Parish has many interesting features. Great Linford has three ponds, an ancient manor with a church dating back to Saxon times. With a medieval tiled floor and brasses and Georgian Bells. At the next bridge you can see where the Newport Canal used to start. The duck pond on Giffard Park is the only stretch that remains today!

The towpath is in good repair for walking or if you are feeling adventurous you can hire a boat from Peartree Marina and spend a day exploring. The canal is lockfree from Cosgrove to Fenny Stratford and there to be enjoyed by everyone!

BURGLARY ALERT

There have recently been a number of burglaries in the area where homes have been entered for the purpose of stealing car keys and other valuable items such as hand bags, computers, house keys, mobile phones etc.

Entry to homes has been made in a number of ways but, the most common involves the offender gaining access via doors which have not been locked properly. Most of the offences have taken place overnight

• It is imperative that residents ensure that they check, shut and lock all doors and windows before going out and when any room is unoccupied. This includes key locking doors with handle operated locking systems, just pulling the handle up is not enough to prevent entry. The key must be used to actually deadlock the door.



- Do not leave your keys in the door or anywhere nearby where they could possibly be hooked out by an arm or implement through the letter box or cat flap, but keep them in a safe place ready for use in case of an emergency to exit the house.
- Keep your car keys in a hidden location within the house or at least out of sight of doors and windows. Ensure that all garden tools are securely locked away.
- If you have a security alarm system which can be zone set to the ground floor, use this when you go to bed.
- Also ensure that you lock your vehicles and remove any valuable items. Leave the glove box and centre console open to show there is nothing inside.

These included:-

Rubbish sacks being ripped open by animals and birds.

ASB of neighbours.

Problems with delivery of local newspapers. Landscape and Environmental issues.

With the darker nights coming along we were requested to help make our redways a bit safer and to paint the yellow bollards.

This has been actioned. Stantonbury and Bancroft Park had already been done. Bancroft has now been done by our volunteer members and we managed to arrange the NCS youths to come and help us with Bradville. Blue Bridge and Stantonbury Fields will be done next year.

Parking is now our top priority and will be being actioned over the Winter months.

DO YOU REMEMBER.....THE DIAL A BUS?

As we approach the anniversary of 50 years of Milton Keynes a few thoughts come to mind of some of the things that were happening here all those years ago.

One of these was the Dial a Bus scheme which was considered by some as one of the development corporations 'finest moments' ... but was it? In those early days when Milton Keynes was just a series of small estates separated by grid roads a conventional bus service seemed impractical when there were so few passengers. So they came up with a solution and this was to adopt a system like the American Dial and Ride. This was where potential passengers could phone a central office and have a nearby bus dispatched to their door (or close by).

In 1975 the Milton Keynes Dial a Bus scheme was launched, initially in Woughton and MK residents were able to make use of the opportunity of their own 'shared taxi' by ringing 678811.

Unfortunately like all good things it did not last for long! Although popular, especially with young people with plenty of time to spend riding around



their new surroundings on a bus, it was found to be a little too extreme when passengers who wanted to travel just a short

distance had to be prepared for a diversion through various estates and isolated villages in the area.

It probably wasn't too popular either with the bus drivers who had to follow convoluted and scenic routes to pick up and drop off their customers.

PACT - BECOMING A VOLUNTEER MENTOR

Aim: Our service is designed to provide support to offenders through mentoring to encourage full integration and to promo the social inclusion.

Volunteering of any description is so important. We all have different skills, interests and passions and to have the chance to share some of those skills is a privilege!

Prison Advice and Care Trust provides support to offenders, those who have served their sentence and their families. One of the many services PACT provide is Volunteer Mentoring. The support our Volunteer Mentors offer varies and could involve both visiting at the prison or within the community and is such an import ant and vital support to those who want to move forward with their life. We are loo king for people who can build up and encourage others, have a reliable and dependable attitude and have great communication skills!

As a volunteer mentor you would have opportunities such as visiting within the prison, accompanying your mentee to appointments and meetings, researching and developing links with the mentee and local services in their community. Also you may have the opportunity to meet offenders in custody before release and at the gate on the day of release, where appropriate. As a mentor it could be as simple as encouraging someone to join a group, or support with searching for a job or just listening and allowing them to have space and time to connect with someone! Many offenders do not have visitors in prison and this makes a huge difference to motivation, self-esteem and choices in life, as they re-ent er society.

We provide full and ongoing training and all our volunteers have regular support and opportunities to further their skills and knowledge.

- To respect confidentiality according to Pact policies
- To keep in touch with your co-ordinator
- To carry out admin tasks (Volunteer Agreement, Contact Records and Expense Forms)
- To attend volunteer support meetings

Anyone who applies without the following skills or experience will still be considered, as we provide training and support which will help you work towards acquiring these skills.

Other: This post is subject to security clearances and enhanced DBS. This post is for those who are 18 years and over.
