Chairman's Remarks

As we approach Spring, I would like to advise residents of a number of important actions being undertaken by Stantonbury Parish Council and Milton Keynes Council throughout the next few months.

Firstly, we have reached our final version of the Neighbourhood Plan after much negotiation and review with the external examiners. Shortly you will be invited to participate in the referendum to vote either for or against the proposals. Nearer to the time we will issue the final version of the Plan to all households and as usual copies will be available on the website. Please use your vote.

The second action being taken is the introduction of parking restrictions across the Parish in those areas where parking has presented difficulties and in some instances discord in the community. We have endeavoured to address the parking issues

with a sensible solution based on the feedback received during the Bradville pilot consultation.

The parking proposals have been on the Parish website for some time and The Traffic Regulation Order for these restrictions has now been approved and issued. Those residents affected will be notified by Milton Keynes Council either by letter or by signage. It is planned that these works will commence in March 2020.

Finally, Bradville regeneration is again becoming a hot topic and we have invited Mr Michael Kelleher, Director of Housing and Regeneration, MKC, to our Main Meeting on the 19th February 2020. It is important to note that the approach by MKC this time round is completely different to that previously tried with a stronger involvement of the local resident associations and the Parish Council. To ensure a co-ordinated approach, Mrs Donna Moore (donna.moore@

stantonburyparishcouncil.org.uk) will be the primary contact point for regeneration questions directed to the Parish.

As usual if you have any questions, suggestions or ideas for the community please do get in touch.

May I take this opportunity to invite you to an Evening to Meet Your Councillors on Tuesday 21st April 2020 from 5.30pm, details of which you will find on page 10.

Thanks to the council for placing the temporary speed monitor on Bradwell Road next to the busy shops, pub and bus stop area. It has made a tremendous difference and must make the area safer. Initially there was a lot of heavy braking to get below 30mph but now almost all drivers respect the limit and travel down the road at a sensible speed. Strangely enough it also seems to have had a positive effect on the cars travelling the other way! If it were possible to place a monitor there permanently it would be great and even better if a Smiley Face/Thank you monitor could be placed there'.

SPC Response:

Thank you for your feedback regarding the effectiveness of the speed Indicator sign. The Council does realise that speeding is a problem in the Parish and we wanted to introduce a 20mph speed limit throughout. However, without road deaths or serious injuries MKC will not entertain this. This attitude appears counterintuitive to me?

We do keep records of the number of vehicles exceeding the speed limit. Their speed and time of day etc. are included. We analyse and publish this information in the Parish Newsletter and our website. Regrettably we do not have funding for permanent speed indicator signs, but if sufficient demand is received we can look into this.

I would take this opportunity to draw your attention to the Parish Council meeting on the 21st April 2020 where the public can detail to the Council what priorities we should work on. Perhaps you could raise it there? Please feel free to raise other issues that concern you'.

Stantonbury Parish Council Budget 2020/21

It's that time of year again when the Parish Council needs to work out how much money we're going to be spending on the next financial year and submit a request to Milton Keynes Council (MKC) for our 'precept'.


The precept is a proportion of the Council Tax that you pay MKC. This year, again, we have decided to minimise the amount we are asking for, and have requested a small 2% increase on last year. This is less than the Retail Price Index and less than the overall increase in Council Tax – which means that the proportion of your Council Tax that goes to the Parish Council is reducing.

Despite this, we are planning to spend even more on our community than we did last year. The budget headlines are:

- Spend on the Community to be doubled to £120,000 (blue section of chart)
- We will spend an extra £100,000 on Parish Upkeep next year (green section)
- The percentage that we spend on the Parish Office is down to 28% of overall expenditure
- We will be using over £50,000 of our reserves for new equipment to help the upkeep of the Parish

The chart below shows the breakdown of how we intend to spend our expected income of £480,000.

Walking for Health

Do you want to feel good about yourself, have more energy, reduce stress and sleep better, keep your heart strong and help to manage your weight?

Walking may have the answer for you because almost anyone can do it. You can do it anywhere and at any time. It's a chance to make new friends. It's free and you don't need special equipment and you can start slowly and build up gently.

Do you want to walk but don't know where to go or have anyone to walk with?

Walking for Health organise walks every day of the week in and around Milton Keynes. They usually last for an hour and on most days different groups walk different distances ranging from short – half a mile – to long – almost 4 miles. They usually start and finish at the same place often finishing at a pub or church hall for teas, coffees, biscuits and sometimes sausage rolls! That's when the serious chat happens!

Advice on Fraud and Scams.

Over the last year or so we have, here at TVP, seen an escalation on online scams and fraud. All causing great distress to the victims and families involved and some leading to life changing consequences and emotional distress.

The scams are becoming increasingly sophisticated and any one of us can fall victim regardless of age, background, technology and financial savvy. The scammers use a number of techniques to pull you in. Skilled at building up your trust and using time pressure to encourage their victims to make rash choices which you wouldn't do in normal circumstances.

Take Five to Stop Fraud. This is a national campaign from the Financial Fraud Action UK and Government, backed by the banking industry. It's about taking that moment to pause and think before responding to a text, email or phone call. Keep this simple phrase in your mind:

My money, My info, - I don't think so!"

I felt that due to the escalation of this horrible crime and with myself and colleagues having to deal with one at least every week it would be a good opportunity to put a few steps in place that you may not have already thought of to protect yourself and family and friends.

Request to move money – A genuine bank or organisation will never contact you and ask for your PIN. Only give out personal information to people you trust and expect to be contacted by.

Clicking on links/files – Never click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

Personal information – Question uninvited approaches. Contact the company directly if you want to carry on the conversation. Be wary of the information you post online about yourself.

Passwords – Use random words to make your password strong e.g. 'catschoolship'

Anti-Virus – Make sure this is up to date, back up important data regularly using external device or cloud storage. Use a screen lock.

Wi-Fi hot spots - Remember not all are secure, cyber criminals can capture data on insecure Wi-Fi networks.





Do you need Virtual Private Network (known as VPN) or can you use your 3G,4G or 5G? Always use a trusted Wi-Fi hotspot operated by the venue where you are.

Online shopping and Auction sites- These are sites that we use on a daily basis where we can buy items from around the world which vastly opens up our range of choices. Be wary of offers that look too good to be true. Research the seller/buyer before committing. Be wary of paying by bank transfer or virtual currency.

Computer Software Service Fraud – Criminals may cold call you claiming you have some sort of computer problem and they can help you solve it, use names like Microsoft, Apple etc. and using the name of your broadband provider to sound legitimate. Remember genuine computer service companies don't make these calls. Don't let anyone remotely access your computer. Ask yourself why are they calling you?

Online Banking – Protect your password and personal details. Keep banking and software apps up to date. Log out of online banking when you have finished. Just turning off your device may not be sufficient enough. Do not use public available Wi-Fi networks for banking.



Universal What is it?

Universal Credit is a means tested benefit for people of low income. It is for people of working age. The upper limit of the working age criteria is state pension age.

What does it replace?

Universal Credit replaces income-based job seekers allowance, income related employment and support allowance, income support, housing benefit, child tax credit and working tax credit.

How can Citizens Advice help?

Citizens Advice can help you to apply and explain the procedure, so you understand how to manage your account and communicate with your work coach.

Who is it for?

Universal Credit is for people of working age. It can be paid whether you are working, seeking work or unable to work. It is paid monthly, and most people are expected to seek or be in full time work while on the benefit.

How can it be accessed?

You can claim online. This can be accessed on Gov.uk - type Universal Credit in the search field - Apply for Universal Credit.

If you need help to complete your Universal Credit application Citizens Advice can do that, and if you have any questions contact us through the following channels:

What does the service offer?



They are able to help fill in forms and can chat through many of the concerns that you may have. If you need further support or information they can refer you to our Information & Advice Service. Our 84 volunteers visit a total of 90 older people on a regular basis, usually every week.

We do not make a charge for this service. As there is a high demand for this service we prioritise people who do not have relatives or friends living nearby and

Stantonbury Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers that have helped the Rangers in 2019. We are looking forward to working with you all again in 2020.


The litter picks have continued to be a great success and a big welcome to Stantonbury International School who helped at Oakridge Park in November.

Senior Citizens of the Parish

You will have read elsewhere in this magazine about the Christmas activities laid on by the Parish Council for some of our senior citizens. In addition to the two Christmas lunches, Thames Valley Police, in conjunction with Aldi, provided Christmas Hampers to those that were unable to attend.

What has become very apparent to the Parish Council during these events is that we have an aging population of residents who need more support from us and the community as a whole. We have therefore cancelled the refurbishment of the Parish Offices and diverted these funds toward providing more support for our older residents.

Older people are especially vulnerable to loneliness and social isolation – and it can have a serious effect on health. Whatever the cause, it's shockingly easy to be left feeling alone and vulnerable, which can lead to depression and a serious decline in physical health. I'm sure that none of us would like to think any of our parents, relatives and friends being in this situation.

The Parish Council is therefore embarking on a local initiative to identify any person who may need further support, and we need your help.

We are going to start running sessions such as bingo, card games, coffee mornings, 'silver surfer' courses, smart phone sessions and so on. We will also provide a meeting point where people can come and enjoy

company in a safe environment. We welcome any suggestions for other activities that will benefit our elderly residents.

In the summer we will be holding parties similar to those at Christmas. Please keep any eye out for the details of events on our website, Facebook and other social media and do mention the events to anyone you feel may benefit from participation.

If you believe a person is in a vulnerable situation please contact the Parish Office, Thames Valley Police or Age UK.

- 8. Talk about practical barriers
- 9. Ask other people for help



Young People's Mental Health

Do you know a young person who might benefit from talking to someone?

At Stantonbury Parish Council, in conjunction with our partner YiS, we offer FREE counselling for young people aged between 11 and 21 who live in our parish.

What is Counselling?

Counselling is a way of helping you with your problems. It's based on building a trusting relationship between you and your counsellor. It can help you talk about your experiences and make sense of them. Counselling can help to express difficult feelings and learn how to manage them in a helpful way.

Counsellors are trained to listen thoughtfully and carefully to your problems without judging or criticising. They do not give advice but support young people to make positive decisions for themselves.



What sort of things can Counselling help with?

Counselling can help with anything that we are struggling to cope with in our lives. It could be family problems, exam pressure, self-harm, bullying, anxiety, feeling overwhelmed or perhaps a bereavement whatever it is, counselling can help and YiS are the experts in counselling for Young People.

SPEEDWATCH

As you may have seen in previous magazines, we are looking to reduce the speeding in our Parish. Stantonbury Parish Council has purchased a Sentinel Camera and this device records registration numbers of the vehicles that are speeding. This data then gets passed to Thames Valley Police for them to enforce. Stantonbury Parish Council are not looking to fine residents but purely looking to reduce the speeding on our roads in the Parish.

With the data we have collected from our Temporary Speed Indicator Device (TSID) we have picked the speeding hotspots in



the Parish where we are going to start the Speedwatch scheme. This scheme will be working alongside Thames Valley Police and Stantonbury Parish Council volunteers.
